

Statement on Duty To Report

At Southdown, we operate as Regulated Health Professionals, under the laws of the Province of Ontario, and fully comply with all regulations regarding confidentiality and limits to confidentiality, including all mandatory reporting laws. We regard physical, emotional, sexual, and/or financial abuse of a child, and/or an elder, and/or a member of a vulnerable population to be crimes that require mandatory reporting. Our practices are consistent with current legislation such as the Regulated Health Professions Act (RHPA) (Ontario), the Child, Youth and Family Services Act (Ontario), and the Criminal Code of Canada. The laws that govern our work are the same laws that govern the work of all licensed, regulated mental health providers in Ontario.

As an independent and accredited healthcare organization that specializes in providing psychological services for the mental, emotional, and spiritual health of ordained clergy, vowed religious, lay pastoral ministers, and adults, Southdown is dedicated to healing and health. Our Vision Statement "Healthy Individuals, Healthy Communities, Healthy Church" articulates our commitment to the health of the population we serve by providing restorative and preventative services. Guided by our core values, we strive to achieve our Mission through ongoing professional development and evaluation of our existing services in alignment with best practices, resulting in continuous improvements.
